MISSION

The Tahoe-Baikal Institute (TBI) promotes international understanding and global cooperation in meeting environmental challenges through inspiring, place-based watershed education in two of the world's premiere freshwater ecosystems: Lake Tahoe in the Sierra Nevada and Lake Baikal in southern Siberia.





PROGRAMS

SUMMER ENVIRONMENTAL EXCHANGE (SEE) – Each year, TBI unites promising young leaders from around the world in a 10-week exchange at Lakes Tahoe and Baikal to study watersheds, develop leadership skills, learn from science and policy professionals, and actively participate in research and restoration projects in local communities.

PROFESSIONAL EXCHANGES & WORKSHOPS – TBI facilitates workshops, study tours, and internships focused on community sustainability, professional development, cultural exchange, and partnership building.

ENVIRONMENTAL EDUCATIONAL CENTER – TBI is developing the Tahoe Basin's only place-based environmental education center for overnight groups of all ages at a USDA Forest Service-owned site on the northeastern shore of Fallen Leaf Lake adjacent to Lake Tahoe.

RESULTS

• TBI has over 350 alumni worldwide contributing in the fields of science, natural resource protection and management, community sustainability, policy development, and civil society.

• TBI's emphasis on place-based service learning results in exchange participants substantively contributing to on-the-ground research, conservation, restoration, and planning projects, thus benefiting local organizations, agencies, and communities.

• TBI projects support sustainable communities and a healthy environment by focusing on important watershed issues, including aquatic invasive species, water quality monitoring, restoration planning, fisheries management, forest health, and transportation planning, among several others.



• TBI Programs are made possible by contributions from individuals, corporations, small businesses and partner organizations (~60%); restricted grants (~24%); program fees (16%) ; and from other sources such as events (~13%).

• Program and administrative expenses are kept to a minimum thanks to generous in-kind support from many partners. Expenses are as follows: Programs (~87%), Management and General Admin(~7%), Fundraising (~6%).

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
